- What you need to connect
  Use a smart phone, tablet or
  computer with a microphone and
  camera for your telehealth visit. You
  also need good internet services.
- Use Zoom
  If you are using a smart phone or tablet, download the Zoom app.
  You do not need to download the app if you are using a computer.

- 4 Get instructions from your email
  The day of your appointment, open the email from Barrett Hospital & HealthCare about your virtual appointment. This message will contain the link to your appointment.
- At your visit
  At your scheduled time, click on the link provided in your email to start the appointment and enter a virtual waiting room—you don't need to click anything on this screen.
  A provider will join you shortly to start the visit!



#### PATIENT REVENUE SOURCE


